4. **Surprise:** Wide eyes, open mouth, raised eyebrows.
5. **Embarrassment/Blushing:** Rosy cheeks (often indicated with lines or color), averted gaze, nervous smile.

Practice drawing these expressions repeatedly. Observing [anime facial expressions](#) in various media is invaluable.
