1. **Eye contact:** Engage with your interviewer to show attentiveness and sincerity.
2. **Good posture:** Sit up straight, but don't be rigid.
3. **A firm handshake:** (if applicable in a post-pandemic world, or a confident greeting).
4. **Active listening:** Nod, lean slightly forward, and avoid fidgeting.

The Power of a Smile and Positive Attitude

A genuine smile can disarm nerves and create a more positive atmosphere. Approach the interview with enthusiasm and a positive outlook, demonstrating your eagerness to be there.

Asking Thoughtful Questions

The interview is a two-way street. Having well-prepared, insightful questions demonstrates your genuine interest and engagement with the program. Avoid questions that can be easily answered by looking at the school's website. Instead, focus on:

1. **Curriculum specifics:** "I noticed the school has a strong emphasis on problem-based learning. Could you elaborate on how this is implemented in the early years?"
2. **Research opportunities:** "Are there opportunities for students to engage in research during their first or second year, particularly in [specific area of interest]?"
3. **Student life and support:** "What are some of the most popular extracurricular activities for medical students, and what support systems are in place for students facing academic or personal challenges?"
4. **Faculty engagement:** "How involved are faculty members in mentoring students outside of the classroom?"

Aim to ask 2-3 well-researched questions per interviewer.

Post-Interview Etiquette

The interview doesn't end when you leave the room. Follow these steps to leave a lasting positive impression:

The Thank-You Note: A Crucial Step

Send a personalized thank-you email within 24 hours of your interview. Reiterate your interest in the program and briefly mention something specific you discussed with the interviewer. Keep it concise and professional.

Reflecting on Your Performance

After the interview, take time to reflect on your performance. What went well? What could you have done better? This self-assessment is invaluable for future interviews and for your personal growth.
