How many stitches to cast on? This depends on your yarn weight, needle size, and desired blanket width. A good starting point for a worsted weight yarn and US size 8 needles for a 30-inch wide blanket might be around 90-110 stitches. You can always knit a small swatch to check your width.

Step 2: Knitting the First Row (Garter Stitch)
