After nearly two and a half decades in the East, the Polos, with Kublai Khan's reluctant permission, finally began their journey home in 1292. This time, they opted for a maritime route, sailing from the port of Zayton (Quanzhou) in China, through the South China Sea, across the Indian Ocean, and around the southern tip of Africa, eventually reaching Venice in 1295. This sea voyage was no less perilous than their overland trek, facing storms, pirates, and disease.

Upon their return, Marco Polo's tales were met with a mixture of awe and disbelief. Many considered his stories to be elaborate fabrications, earning him the nickname "Il Milione" (The Million), implying he told a million lies. However, his encounters with merchants and scholars of the time helped to corroborate at least parts of his narrative. It was during his subsequent imprisonment in Genoa that Marco Polo dictated his experiences to Rustichello da Pisa, a fellow prisoner. This collaboration resulted in the book that would immortalize his name.

The Impact of Marco Polo's Silk Road Narratives
