"What is your nursing philosophy?"

This is about your core beliefs and values as a nurse. Focus on patient advocacy, holistic care, evidence-based practice, and lifelong learning.

Example: "My nursing philosophy centers on providing compassionate, holistic, and patient-centered care. I believe in treating each patient as an individual with unique needs, involving them and their families in care decisions whenever possible. I am committed to utilizing evidence-based practice to ensure the highest quality of care and to continuously advocate for my patients' well-being and dignity. I also believe in fostering a supportive and collaborative environment with my colleagues, as teamwork is essential for optimal patient outcomes."

"Where do you see yourself in 5 years?"

Show ambition and a desire for growth within the nursing profession. Align

your goals with opportunities at the facility. *Example:* "In five years, I see myself as a highly competent and trusted RN within a specialty area, potentially [mention a specialty relevant to the facility, e.g., critical care or pediatrics]. I am eager to take on more responsibility, perhaps through leadership roles on committees or by pursuing advanced certifications like [mention a relevant certification, e.g., CCRN or PCCN]. I'm also interested in opportunities to mentor new nurses and contribute to quality improvement initiatives. I believe [Facility Name] offers an excellent environment for me to achieve these professional development goals."

"Do You Have Any Questions for Us?"

This is your opportunity to demonstrate engagement and further assess if the role is a good fit for you. Always have questions prepared! Avoid questions whose answers are easily found on the facility's website.

Good questions to ask:

1. "What opportunities are available for professional development and continuing education?"
2. "What is the typical nurse-to-patient ratio on this unit?"
3. "How does the team handle communication and collaboration between shifts?"
4. "What are the biggest challenges facing this unit/department right now?"
5. "How is success measured for nurses in this role?"
6. "What is the onboarding and orientation process like for new hires?"
7. "What are the opportunities for nurses to get involved in research or quality improvement initiatives?"

Beyond the Questions: Essential

Interview Tips for RNs

Preparation extends beyond just knowing the answers. Your overall presentation matters.

Research the Facility Thoroughly

Understand their mission, values, patient population, recent news, and any specialties or awards they have. This will inform your answers and questions.

Dress Professionally

Opt for business professional attire. A well-fitting suit or professional separates convey respect for the interview process and the organization.

Practice Your Answers

Rehearse your answers, especially for behavioral and situational questions, to ensure they are clear, concise, and impactful. Practice with a friend or family member.

Be Punctual

Arrive 10-15 minutes early for in-person interviews. For virtual interviews, ensure your technology is tested and log in a few minutes ahead of time.

Maintain Positive Body Language

Make eye contact, offer a firm handshake (if in-person), sit upright, and nod to show you're engaged. Avoid fidgeting.

Be Honest and Authentic

While you want to present your best self, authenticity is key. Interviewers can often sense insincerity.

Follow Up

Send a thank-you note or email within 24 hours of the interview. Reiterate your interest and briefly mention something specific you discussed.
