The time to reach trace varies greatly depending on your recipe and whether you use an immersion blender (which significantly speeds up the process).

Once you've reached a light to medium trace, it's time to add your essential oils, fragrance oils, colorants, and any other additives like exfoliants. Stir them in thoroughly. Be aware that some fragrance oils and essential oils can accelerate trace, meaning they can thicken the batter very quickly. If this happens, work swiftly to pour your soap.

Step 8: Pouring the Soap

Carefully pour your thickened soap batter into your prepared mold. Tap the mold gently on your work surface to release any air bubbles.

Cover your mold with a piece of cardboard or a lid. For many recipes, insulating the mold with towels or a blanket will encourage the soap to go through "gel phase." This is when the soap heats up significantly during saponification, resulting in brighter colors and a faster cure. Allow the soap to sit undisturbed for 24-48 hours. It should

3. **Ricing:** The soap batter thickens and clumps, looking like rice. This can be caused by adding fragrance oils too early or at too high a temperature, or by insufficient mixing. Work quickly to pour or consider re-blending very carefully.
4. **Separation:** The soap batter splits, with oil and water separating. This can happen if the batter doesn't reach a sufficient trace. Sometimes, re-blending is possible, but it can be difficult.
