Ensure the email is error-free and professional.

2. Reflect and Learn

After each interview, take time to reflect on your performance. What went well? What could you have done better? What questions surprised you? Use this reflection to refine your answers and your preparation for future stages of the application process. Every interview is a learning opportunity.
