4. **Dig Boxes:** A shallow container filled with safe substrate (like sand or rice, used sparingly and supervised) can offer a different texture and digging experience.

Rotate toys regularly to keep things novel and engaging for your hedgehog.

5. **Dairy Products:** Hedgehogs are lactose intolerant and can suffer from digestive issues.
6. **Chocolate:** Highly toxic.
7. **Raw Fish:** Can contain an enzyme that destroys thiamine (vitamin B1).
8. **Spicy Foods:** Will cause significant discomfort.

Water Access: Always Available

If you suspect WHS, consult your veterinarian immediately.

Obesity:

Overfeeding and lack of exercise can lead to obesity, which can exacerbate other health problems like heart disease and diabetes. Ensure your hedgehog has an exercise wheel and is fed a balanced diet. Monitor their weight regularly.

Respiratory Infections:

These can be caused by dusty bedding, drafts, or poor ventilation. Symptoms include sneezing, wheezing, and discharge from the nose or eyes. Maintaining proper temperature and providing clean, dust-free bedding is crucial for prevention.

Quill Care:

Hedgehogs shed and regrow quills throughout their lives, a process called "quilling." This can be uncomfortable for them, and they may become more irritable during this time. The Art of Gentle Handling

When they are initially shy or fearful, offer a favorite treat (like a mealworm) to create positive associations.

Nail trimming is also important to prevent them from snagging on their bedding or causing injury.
