2. **Fire Lay:** Common fire lays include the teepee, log cabin, and lean-to. Each has advantages for different conditions.
3. **Lighting the Fire:** Use appropriate fire starters (waterproof matches, lighter, ferro rod). Light the tinder first, allowing it to ignite the kindling.
4. **Maintaining the Fire:** Add fuel wood gradually as the fire grows. Keep the fire manageable in size.
5. **Extinguishing the Fire:** This is a critical safety step. Douse the fire thoroughly with water, stir the ashes and embers, and douse again. Feel the ashes with the back of your hand to ensure they are cool before leaving the campsite.

Understanding **fire safety outdoors** is paramount.

Requirement 4: Cooking and Food Safety

Beyond menu planning, this requirement focuses on the execution of camp cooking.

4a. With your patrol, cook at least one breakfast, one lunch, and one dinner during a campout.

This is where practical skills are honed. Scouts will learn to:

1. **Meal Preparation:** Measure ingredients, chop vegetables, and prepare food in a safe and hygienic manner.
2. **Cooking Techniques:** Use the camp stove or campfire effectively. Master techniques like boiling, simmering, and frying.
3. **Time Management:** Coordinate cooking so all components of the meal are ready at the same time.
4. **Cleanup:** Proper dishwashing techniques using minimal water and biodegradable soap are essential. Dispose of wash water properly, away from water sources.

4b. Demonstrate proper food storage and sanitation methods.

This is crucial for preventing foodborne illness and deterring wildlife:

1. **Refrigeration:** Use coolers packed with ice or ice packs to keep perishable items cold.
2. **Airtight Containers:** Store all food in airtight containers to prevent contamination and odors.
3. **Bear Bags/Canisters:** In bear country, learn to properly hang food bags or use bear-resistant canisters.
4. **Handwashing:** Thorough handwashing before and after preparing food, and after using the latrine, is vital.
5. **Washing Utensils:** Wash dishes promptly after use.
6. **Waste Disposal:** Pack out all food scraps. Never bury food waste.

These practices are essential for **hygiene in the wilderness**.

Requirement 5: First Aid and Emergency Preparedness

This requirement emphasizes the importance of being prepared for the unexpected.

5a. Discuss the steps for treating common camp injuries and illnesses.

Scouts should be familiar with:

1. **Cuts and Scrapes:** Cleaning, antiseptic, bandaging.
2. **Blisters:** Prevention, treatment (e.g., moleskin).
3. **Insect Bites and Stings:** Antihistamines, calamine lotion, recognizing severe reactions.
4. **Minor Burns:** Cooling the burn with water, antiseptic ointment, bandaging.
5. **Sprains and Strains:** R.I.C.E. (Rest, Ice, Compression, Elevation).
6. **Hypothermia and Heat Exhaustion:** Recognizing symptoms and basic treatment.
7. **Dehydration:** Recognizing symptoms and rehydration strategies.

5b. Explain the contents of a personal first-aid kit and how to use them.

A basic kit should include:

1. Adhesive bandages (various sizes)
2. Gauze pads and roller bandages
3. Antiseptic wipes or solution
4. Antibiotic ointment
5. Pain relievers (e.g., ibuprofen)
6. Tweezers
7. Safety pins
8. Medical tape
9. Any personal medications

5c. Discuss what to do in case of an emergency.

This includes:

1. **Assess the Situation:** Ensure your own safety before approaching an injured person.

6b. Discuss the importance of conservation and how you can practice it while camping.

Conservation is about protecting natural resources for future generations. While camping, Scouts can practice conservation by:

1. Following Leave No Trace principles.
2. Minimizing water usage.
3. Properly disposing of waste.
4. Respecting wildlife habitats.
5. Participating in local conservation efforts if opportunities arise.
6. Educating others about conservation practices.

This requirement connects camping to the broader theme of environmental stewardship, a core tenet of Scouting.
