While often seen as a proactive strategy, positive reinforcement is equally vital in addressing challenging behaviours. Redirecting a student's attention or behaviour is often more effective than direct confrontation.

1. **Catch Them Being Good:** When a student who was previously disruptive begins to engage positively, acknowledge it immediately. This reinforces the desired behaviour.
2. **Planned Ignoring:** For minor attention-seeking behaviours, strategically ignoring the behaviour while praising a nearby student who is on task can be effective.

3. **Non-Verbal Cues:** Subtle signals like a raised eyebrow, a gentle tap on the desk, or a pointed look can often redirect a student without disrupting the entire class.
4. **Redirection to Task:** Gently guide a student back to their work or the expected activity. "John, remember we are working on our math problems now. Can I help you find where you left off?"

2. Effective Communication and De-escalation Techniques

When addressing a student exhibiting challenging behaviour, communication is key. The goal is to de-escalate the situation and help the student regain control.

1. **Stay Calm:** Your own emotional state significantly impacts the student's. Take a deep breath and speak in a calm, even tone.
2. **Get Down to Their Level:** Kneeling or sitting beside a child makes you less intimidating and more approachable.

5. **Loss of Privileges:** This can be effective if the privilege is directly related to the misbehaviour (e.g., losing access to a preferred activity due to disruptive behaviour during that activity).

It's crucial that consequences are applied consistently and that the focus remains on learning from mistakes, not on shame or punishment.

4. Addressing Specific Challenging Behaviours

Certain behaviours require specific strategies:

1. **Aggression:** Immediate intervention to ensure safety, followed by a discussion about anger management and appropriate conflict resolution.
2. **Disruption/Off-Task Behaviour:** Clear expectations, frequent check-ins, engaging activities, and

3. **Withdrawal/Shyness:** Gentle encouragement, opportunities for low-stakes participation, and building confidence through small successes.
4. **Non-Compliance:** Clear instructions, consistent routines, positive reinforcement for compliance, and understanding potential underlying reasons for defiance.
