Step 4: Stitch the Lap

Using your zipper foot, stitch the lapped side. Position the fabric so that you are stitching through all layers: the lap, the zipper tape, and the seam allowance underneath. Stitch along the edge of the zipper teeth, creating a neat line that secures the lap and the zipper. Backstitch at the beginning and end.

Step 5: Finishing Touches

Turn the garment right side out. Check that the zipper operates smoothly and that the lap lies flat. You may need to trim any excess fabric from the seam allowances for a cleaner finish.

3. How to Sew an Invisible Zipper

The invisible zipper creates a seamless, professional finish where the zipper teeth are hidden. This technique requires a specialized foot and careful precision.

Step 1: Prepare the Opening

Sew the seam where the invisible zipper will be inserted, stopping at the zipper's end point. Press the seam allowances to one side, away from the seam line. This creates a flat surface for attaching the zipper.

Step 2: Prepare the Zipper

Lay the zipper face down along the seam line on the right side of the fabric. The zipper teeth should be aligned with the seam line. Pin the zipper in place, ensuring it's as close to the edge of the fabric as possible.

Step 3: Stitch the First Side (with Invisible Zipper Foot)

very close to the zipper teeth. Position the fabric so the needle will stitch into the very edge of the zipper teeth, on the side of the fabric with the seam allowances pressed away. Sew down the length of the zipper tape, removing pins as you go. Backstitch at the beginning and end.

Step 4: Stitch the Second Side

Open the fabric and the zipper. Reposition the fabric to stitch the other side. Ensure the zipper is laid flat and the seam allowances are still pressed away. Align the fabric and the zipper teeth. Using your invisible zipper foot again, stitch down the second side of the zipper, again stitching very close to the teeth. Backstitch at the beginning and end.

Step 5: Finishing Touches

Close the zipper. You will notice that the zipper teeth are now hidden. Open the fabric to reveal the seam. You will likely have a small opening at the bottom where the two sides of the zipper meet. To finish this, you can hand-stitch the bottom of the zipper tape to the seam allowance or machine stitch a small bar tack for reinforcement.
