off neatly, you'll typically *slip stitch* into the chain-1 space of the first petal. 3. Yarn over and pull through the first two loops on your hook.
4. Yarn over and pull through the remaining two loops on your hook.

Slip Stitch (sl st): For Joining and Finishing

Used to join rounds, move between stitches without adding height, and secure the yarn at the end of a project.

1. Insert your hook into the next stitch.
2. Yarn over and pull up a loop, and then pull that loop directly through the loop already on your hook.

A Simple & Sweet Tiny Crochet Flower Pattern (Beginner-Friendly)

1. Join your petal yarn to any stitch of the center. Chain 2 (counts as your first half double crochet).
2. Work 1 half double crochet (hdc) in the same stitch.
3. Chain 2.
4. Slip stitch (sl st) into the same stitch.
5. Slip stitch (sl st) into the next stitch of the center. (This moves you to the next stitch to begin your next petal).

6. Repeat steps 1-5 four more times to create a total of 5 petals.

After completing the last petal and slip stitching into the next stitch of the center, fasten off your yarn. Carefully weave in all ends using your yarn needle. Trim any excess yarn.
