Using Abrasive Cleaners or Toothpaste

Toothpaste, mouthwash with alcohol, and abrasive household cleaners can scratch and dull the surface of your retainer. These scratches can create tiny crevices where bacteria can thrive, making it harder to keep your retainer clean and potentially leading to discoloration and odor.

Sharing Your Retainer Brush

Never use the same toothbrush for your teeth and your retainer. This practice can transfer bacteria between your mouth and the appliance, defeating the purpose of cleaning.

Storing a Damp Retainer

Always ensure your retainer is completely dry before placing it in its case. A damp environment is a breeding ground for mold and bacteria. Leave it to air dry in a clean, well-ventilated space.
