tension issues.

2. Skipped Stitches

4. **Incorrect Needle:** A dull or wrong type of needle can snag and pull the fabric.
5. **Thread Type:** Using a very thick thread on a fine fabric can cause puckering.
6. **Presser Foot Pressure:** Some machines allow you to adjust the presser foot pressure. If it's too high, it can stretch the fabric.

6. Machine Not Feeding Fabric (Feed Dog Issues)

If your fabric isn't moving forward or backward under the needle, it's likely an issue with the feed dogs. These are the small metal teeth under the presser foot that grip and move the fabric.

Causes and Solutions:

1. **Feed Dogs Lowered:** Most machines have a lever or dial to lower the feed dogs for free-motion quilting or embroidery. Ensure they are raised for normal sewing.
2. **Lint and Debris:** Lint can get lodged between the feed dogs, preventing them from moving the fabric. Clean the feed dog area thoroughly.
3. **Fabric Too Thick or Heavy:** For extremely heavy fabrics, the feed dogs might struggle. Consider a more robust machine or a walking foot.
4. **Feed Dog Adjustment:** On some machines, the height and position of the feed dogs can be adjusted. This is a more advanced repair and may require professional assistance.

7. Unusual Noises

A sewing machine should have a relatively smooth hum. Grinding, clanking, or loud squeaking noises often indicate a mechanical problem.

Causes and Solutions:

1. **Lack of Lubrication:** This is a common cause of squeaking. Consult your manual for oiling points and use the recommended sewing machine oil.
2. **Lint and Debris:** Accumulated lint can cause friction and noise. Clean your machine thoroughly.
3. **Loose Parts:** Check for any loose screws or parts, especially around the needle area and the bobbin case.
4. **Bent Needle Hitting Throat Plate:** A bent needle can strike the throat plate, causing a clicking or clanking sound. Replace the needle.
5. **Internal Mechanical Issues:** If the noise persists after cleaning and checking for loose parts, it's time for a professional service.

stitches, thread breakage, and fabric damage. A good rule of thumb is to change your needle every 6-8 hours of sewing time, or with every new project.

4. **Bobbin Winding:** Ensure your bobbins are wound evenly and smoothly. An unevenly wound bobbin can cause tension issues and thread jamming.
5. **Proper Threading:** Always thread your machine carefully and correctly. Make sure the presser foot is up when threading the upper thread.
6. **Use Quality Materials:** Invest in good quality sewing machines, needles, and thread. Cheap materials are often the source of problems.
7. **Read Your Manual:** Your sewing machine manual is your best friend. It contains specific information about your model, including threading diagrams, tension adjustments, and maintenance tips.
