Models represent the data of your application. They interact with the database, handle data validation, and encapsulate business logic. In Rails, models are Ruby classes that inherit from `ActiveRecord::Base`, providing powerful features for database operations.

Example: Creating a simple Article model

We'll use the `rails generate` command again:

```
rails generate model Article title:string body:text
```

This command:

1. Creates `app/models/article.rb`.
2. Creates a database migration file in `db/migrate/` to define the `articles` table with `title` (string) and `body` (text) columns.

After generating the model, you need to run the migration to create the table in your database:

```
rails db:migrate
```

The `app/models/article.rb` file will look something like this:

```
class Article < ActiveRecord::Base
end
```

You can now create, read, update, and delete articles using ActiveRecord methods. For example, in the Rails console (`rails console`), you could do:

```
Article.create(title: "My First Article", body: "This is the content of my first
article.")
Article.all
```

Views

Views are responsible for presenting data to the user. In Rails, views are typically HTML files with embedded Ruby (`.erb` files) that dynamically render content. They receive data from controllers and display it.

We've already seen an example of a view with our `GreetingsController`. For the `Article` model, you would create views for listing articles, showing individual articles, creating new ones, etc., usually within `app/views/articles/`.

Controllers

Controllers act as the intermediaries between Models and Views. They receive user requests (via routes), interact with Models to fetch or manipulate data, and then select an appropriate View to render the response. Controller actions are public methods within a controller class.

When you generate a scaffold (a set of model, controller, views, and tests for a resource), Rails

automatically sets up the routes and basic controller actions (index, show, new, create, edit, update, destroy).

Working with Forms and Data Submission

Web applications are interactive, and forms are the primary way users submit data. Rails provides excellent tools for building and handling forms.

Creating a Form for a New Article

Let's create a `new` action in `GreetingsController` and a corresponding view to create an article.

Add the `new` action to `app/controllers/greetings_controller.rb`:

```
class GreetingsController < ApplicationController
  def index
    @message = "Hello from Rails 4!"
  end

  def new
    @article = Article.new # Initialize a new, unsaved Article object
  end
end
```

Create a new view file at `app/views/greetings/new.html.erb`:

```
<h1>Create New Article</h1>

<%= form_for @article do |f| %>
  <div>
    <%= f.label :title %><br>
    <%= f.text_field :title %>
  </div>
  <div>
    <%= f.label :body %><br>
    <%= f.text_area :body %>
  </div>
  <div>
    <%= f.submit "Create Article" %>
  </div>
<% end %>
```

The `form_for @article` helper automatically creates the correct HTML form tag, sets the action URL (to create an article), and the HTTP method (POST). The `f` object (an instance of `ActionView::Helpers::FormBuilder`) provides methods like `label`, `text_field`, and `submit` to generate form elements.

Handling Form Submissions (Creating an Article)

We need to define a route and a controller action to handle the POST request from the form. We'll use the `ArticlesController` for this, which Rails generates with a scaffold. If you haven't generated a scaffold yet, do so:

```
rails generate scaffold Article title:string body:text
rails db:migrate
```

This command generates all the necessary files for CRUD operations on articles, including routes, controller actions, views, and tests. The `ArticlesController` will have a `create` action.

The `app/controllers/articles_controller.rb` generated by the scaffold will look something like this:

```
class ArticlesController < ApplicationController
  # ... other actions ...

  # POST /articles
  # POST /articles.json
  def create
    @article = Article.new(article_params)

    respond_to do |format|
      if @article.save
        format.html { redirect_to @article, notice: 'Article was successfully
created.' }
        format.json { render :show, status: :created, location: @article }
      else
        format.html { render :new }
        format.json { render json: @article.errors, status: :unprocessable_entity
}
      end
    end
  end

  private
  # Never trust parameters from the scary internet, only allow the white list
through.
  def article_params
    params.require(:article).permit(:title, :body)
  end
end
```

Notice the `article_params` private method. This is a strong security measure called "strong parameters," introduced in Rails 4, which ensures that only explicitly permitted attributes can be mass-assigned, preventing security vulnerabilities.

Gems and the Rails Ecosystem

Gems are Ruby libraries that extend Rails' functionality. The Rails ecosystem is incredibly rich with gems for almost any task imaginable.

Adding a Gem

To add a gem, you edit your `Gemfile` (located in the root of your project) and add the gem's name. For example, to add the popular Devise gem for user authentication:

```
# Gemfile
source 'https://rubygems.org'
gem 'rails', '4.2.11' # Or your specific Rails version
gem 'sqlite3', '~> 1.3.6'
gem 'devise' # Add this line
```

After adding a gem to the `Gemfile`, you need to run:

```
bundle install
```

`Bundler` will read the `Gemfile` and install all specified gems and their dependencies.

Many gems also require running Rails generators or migrations. For Devise, you would run:

```
rails generate devise:install
rails generate devise User
rails db:migrate
```

Popular Gems for Rails 4 Development

1. **Devise:** For user authentication.
2. **Pry or Bybug:** For debugging.
3. **Kaminari or Will Paginate:** For pagination.
4. **Bootstrap-Sass or Foundation-Sass:** For frontend styling.
5. **Simple Form:** For creating forms more easily.
