4. **"Line up your crayons from shortest to longest. Draw them in order."** (Ordering by length.)
5. **"Which is heavier, a book or a feather? Draw them and show which one you think is heavier."** (Introducing the concept of weight through estimation and drawing.)

4. Pattern Recognition and Prediction

Prompts

Identifying and extending patterns is a fundamental skill that underpins algebraic thinking. These prompts make pattern work fun and accessible.

Examples:

1. **"Create an ABAB pattern using two different colored crayons. Draw your pattern."** (Basic pattern creation.)
