Take a smaller amount of grey wool and form a smaller ball for the head. Felt it firmly into a spherical shape. Once firm, hold the head against one end of the body and use your needle to felt the join securely. Add a little extra wool around the join and felt it in to create a smooth connection.

Step 3: Ears

Take two tiny wisps of grey wool. Form them into small, flattened oval shapes. Felt them until they are firm and have a slight curve. Attach them to the top sides of the head, felting the base securely into the head.

Step 4: Tail

Take a very thin strand of grey wool. Roll it between your fingers to create a long, thin, rope-like shape. Felt it gently, ensuring it remains thin and flexible. Attach one end to the rear of the body, felting it firmly.

Step 5: Features

For the nose, take a tiny speck of pink or black wool and felt it onto the tip of the muzzle. For the eyes, you can either felt tiny black dots or use small black seed beads, carefully securing them with a needle. If using beads, push the needle through the bead and into the wool multiple times to embed it securely.

Step 6: Refinement

Use a fine needle to smooth out any rough patches and refine the overall shape. You can gently poke any areas that seem too lumpy or uneven. You can add a little white wool to the ears or chest for subtle detail.

You can also add small wisps of wool to fill in any dips or uneven areas. Constant rotation and checking from all angles during the felting process are key to achieving a balanced form.

My parts aren't attaching securely.

When attaching parts, ensure you're poking deep enough into the base of the part and into the main body. You can also add a small amount of extra wool around the join to act as a "glue" and felt it in to create a seamless connection.
