This feature, introduced in iOS 15, iPadOS 15, and macOS Monterey, allows anyone, even those without Apple devices, to join a FaceTime call through a web browser.

1. Open the **FaceTime** app.
2. Tap **Create Link**.
3. You can then choose to copy the link to paste it elsewhere, or share it directly via Messages, Mail, or other apps.
4. When someone clicks the link, they'll be prompted to enter their name and join the call from their web browser. You'll need to approve their entry.

FaceTime Live Photos

Capture still images during your video calls without interrupting the conversation.

1. During an active FaceTime call, tap the screen to reveal controls.
2. Tap the **Capture Photo** button (a white circle with a camera icon).
3. You'll see a shutter sound and a notification that the Live Photo has been saved to your Photos app.
