Don't be afraid to use reference photos of people making expressions, or even other cartoon characters, as a starting point. You can then adapt and stylize them for your own drawings.

Gesture Drawing for Emotion

Try quick gesture drawings focusing solely on the emotional impact of a pose and facial expression, rather than precise anatomical detail. This helps you capture the essence of the feeling.

Experiment with Different Styles

Cartooning isn't monolithic. Explore different styles – from simple, minimalist cartoons to more detailed anime-inspired characters. Each style will have its own nuances in conveying emotion. Understanding these stylistic differences is crucial for becoming a versatile artist.

Develop Your Character's Unique Expressive Quirks

As you become more comfortable, think about what makes your character's expressions unique. Do they have a particular way of raising one eyebrow? Do they always squint when thinking? These subtle character-specific traits add depth and memorability.

Consider the Context

An expression doesn't exist in a vacuum. The situation, the character's personality, and the overall tone of the scene all influence how an emotion is best conveyed. A character might show sadness differently depending on whether they are alone or in front of friends.
