1. Vertical lines represent the strings (from left to right: G, C, E, A).
2. Horizontal lines represent the frets.
3. Dots indicate where to place your fingertips.
4. Numbers near the dots might indicate which finger to use (1=index, 2=middle, 3=ring, 4=pinky).
5. An 'O' above a string means play it open (without pressing any frets).
6. An 'X' above a string means don't play that string (though this is rare on a ukulele).

Essential Beginner Chords

Here are some of the easiest and most frequently used chords that will unlock a huge number of songs:

C Major (C)

This is often the easiest chord to learn. Simply place your ring finger (3) on the A string, third fret.

G Major (G)

This chord uses three fingers. Place your index finger (1) on the C string, second fret. Place your middle finger (2) on the A string, second fret. Place your ring finger (3) on the E string, third fret.

A Minor (Am)

Another simple one. Place your middle finger (2) on the G string, second fret.

Place your index finger (1) on the E string, first fret. Place your middle finger (2) on the G string, second fret.

Practice Tip: Encourage your child to practice transitioning between these chords slowly. It's more important to play them cleanly than to play them fast initially.

Strumming and Rhythm

Basic Strumming Techniques

1. **Downstrum:** Use the index finger or thumb to brush down across all the strings. Keep your wrist loose and let the motion come from the wrist, not the whole arm.
