2. *Il téléphone à sa mère.* (He is telephoning **to** his mother.)
3. *Expliquez à moi ce problème.* (Explain this problem **to** me.)

Note that when referring to pronouns, the structure can change slightly, using tonic pronouns after **à** (e.g., *à moi, à toi, à lui, à elle*).

## Time Expressions: "At" a Specific Time

**À** is used to indicate a specific time of day.
