1. **Granny Square Blankets:** Iconic and endlessly adaptable, granny squares are a classic for a reason. You crochet individual squares and then join them together. This is a great way to use up scrap yarn too.
2. **Striped Blankets:** Simple rows of single, half double, or double crochet in alternating colors create a visually appealing striped effect.
3. **Corner-to-Corner (C2C) Blankets:** These are worked diagonally from one corner to the opposite corner, often using double crochet stitches in small clusters. C2C blankets create a beautiful pixelated or checkered design and are surprisingly easy to learn.
4. **Single/Double Crochet Blankets:** These are the most straightforward, consisting of rows of a single stitch repeated until the desired size is reached.

Intermediate and Advanced Patterns

Once you're comfortable with the basics, you can explore more intricate patterns:

1. **Textured Stitch Blankets:** Patterns incorporating stitches like the cable stitch, puff stitch, or crocodile stitch create beautiful tactile and visual interest.

3. **Colorwork Blankets:** Designs like Fair Isle, intarsia, or mosaic crochet involve working with multiple colors to create complex

Pattern Considerations

1. **Finished Size:** Patterns will specify the dimensions of the finished blanket. Ensure this meets your needs.
2. **Gauge:** This is the number of stitches and rows per 4 inches (10 cm). Your gauge must match the pattern's gauge for the finished size to be accurate. If your gauge is off, you'll need to adjust your hook size.
3. **Skill Level:** Be honest about your abilities. Starting with a pattern marked "beginner" or "easy" will build confidence.
4. **Yarn Requirements:** Patterns will indicate the amount of yarn needed, usually in grams or yards/meters. It's always a good idea to buy a little extra yarn to account for any mistakes or to ensure you have enough from the same dye lot.

Step-by-Step: How to Crochet a Simple Blanket (Example: Single Crochet Blanket)

1. Gauge Swatch

For a blanket that is a multiple of your single crochet stitch, you'll chain a specific number of stitches. For a simple, straight blanket, you'll typically chain an even number of stitches for a standard stitch pattern, or a number that corresponds to your desired width plus one for turning.

Example: If you want a blanket that's approximately 40 inches wide and your gauge swatch shows 16 sc stitches per 4 inches, you'd need to chain 160 stitches (40 inches / 4 inches * 16 stitches). Plus one chain for turning means you'll chain 161 stitches.

3. The First Row

After making your foundation chain, you'll typically skip the first chain from the hook and work your first single crochet stitch into the second chain from the hook. Continue working one single crochet stitch into each chain all the way across. At the end of the row, chain 1 (this is your turning chain) and turn your work.

4. Subsequent Rows

For the next row, work one single crochet stitch into the first stitch of the previous row, and then continue working one single crochet into each stitch across. At the end of the row, chain 1 and turn your work. Repeat this process for every row.

This creates a simple, dense fabric. You'll continue crocheting row after row until your blanket reaches your desired length.

5. Changing Colors (Optional)

If you want stripes, you'll change colors at the end of a row. To do this, when you're working the very last stitch of the row, before you pull through the final loop, drop the current color and pick up the new color. Complete the stitch with the new color. Chain 1 with the new color and turn.

6. Finishing Off

Once your blanket reaches the desired length, you'll need to finish off. At the end of your last row, instead of chaining 1, cut the yarn leaving a tail of about 6 inches. Pull this tail through the last loop on your hook and tug gently to secure. You've just crocheted your first row of a blanket!

Adding Borders and Edges

A well-finished edge can elevate your crochet blanket from homemade to professionally crafted. Borders add structure, prevent

curling, and provide a polished look.

Simple Borders

1. **Single Crochet Border:** Work a round of single crochet stitches evenly around the entire blanket. You'll work 3 sc in each corner stitch to create a smooth turn.
2. **Half Double Crochet Border:** Similar to the sc border but creates a slightly taller edge.

Decorative Borders

1. **Shell Stitch Border:** Creates a scalloped or shell-like effect along the edge.
2. **Picot Border:** Adds small decorative loops along the edge.
3. **Reverse Single Crochet (Crab Stitch):** Working single crochet stitches backward creates a neat, ridged edge.

When adding a border, ensure you work an even number of stitches along each side. For example, if you worked 100 sc stitches across one side, try to work roughly 100 sc stitches along the opposite side. Corners are key – usually working 3 stitches into the corner stitch will help the fabric lie flat.

Weaving in Ends: The Essential Finishing Touch

This is a step many crocheters dread, but it's vital for a durable and tidy blanket. Using your yarn needle, carefully weave the yarn tails

through the backs of your stitches for at least 2-3 inches. Vary the direction you weave to prevent the tail from pulling loose. Trim any excess yarn close to the fabric.

Tips for Success and Troubleshooting

Even with the best intentions, you might encounter challenges. Here are some tips and troubleshooting advice:

1. **Consistency is Key:** Try to maintain consistent tension throughout your project for an even fabric.
2. **Count Your Stitches:** Especially in the beginning rows, count your stitches to ensure you haven't accidentally added or dropped any.
3. **Don't Be Afraid to Frog:** If you notice a mistake a few rows back, it's often easier to "frog" (rip out) your work and start again than to try and fix it.
4. **Blocking:** For some yarn types and patterns (especially lace), blocking can dramatically improve the drape and shape of your blanket. This involves wetting or steaming the finished piece and pinning it to the correct dimensions to dry.
5. **Patience:** Crocheting a blanket is a marathon, not a sprint. Enjoy the process and celebrate your progress!
6. **Seek Help:** Online communities, YouTube tutorials, and local yarn shops are fantastic resources if you get stuck.
