3. Labor costs
4. Supply chain efficiency
5. Economies of scale
6. Outsourcing vs. in-house production

Example Prompt: "Our client, a well-established retail chain, has seen a 10% decline in profits over the last two years. What could be the reasons, and how can they reverse this trend?"

Market Entry/Growth Cases

These cases revolve around a company's decision to enter a new market or expand its presence in an existing one. The key is to assess the attractiveness of the market and the company's ability to succeed.

A common framework here is the **Market Attractiveness & Company Fit Framework**:

1. Market Attractiveness:

1. Market Size and Growth Potential

2. Market Profitability (margins, ROI)

Mergers & Acquisitions (M&A) Cases

These cases involve assessing the strategic rationale and financial viability of a potential merger or acquisition. The focus is on determining if the deal will create value for the acquiring company.

Key considerations for M&A cases include:

 1. Market expansion
 2. Product/service diversification
 3. Access to new technology or talent
 4. Synergies (cost and revenue)
 5. Elimination of competition

Pricing Cases

These cases require you to determine the optimal price for a product or service. They often involve analyzing costs, customer willingness to pay, competitive pricing, and market dynamics.

Approaches to pricing cases:

1. **Cost-Plus Pricing:** Adding a markup to the cost of production. (Often a starting point but rarely optimal).
2. **Competitor-Based Pricing:** Setting prices relative to competitors.
3. **Value-Based Pricing:** Pricing based on the perceived value to the customer. This is often the most

sophisticated approach.

4. **Demand Estimation:** Understanding how price changes affect demand.

You'll often need to calculate:

1. Breakeven points
2. Price elasticity of demand
3. Customer willingness to pay
4. Maximum possible price

Example Prompt: "A software company is launching a new subscription-based service. What price should they charge for it?"

Operations & Supply Chain Cases

These cases focus on improving efficiency, reducing costs, and optimizing processes within a company's operations or supply chain. They can involve issues like inventory management, logistics, manufacturing, and quality control.

Key areas to explore:

1. **Inventory Management:** Just-in-time (JIT), safety stock levels, obsolescence.
2. **Logistics and Transportation:** Route optimization, warehousing, carrier selection.
3. **Manufacturing Efficiency:** Production capacity, cycle times, waste reduction, lean manufacturing.
4. **Procurement and Sourcing:** Supplier relationships, negotiation, cost of raw materials.
5. **Quality Control:** Defect rates, Six Sigma, total quality management (TQM).

Example Prompt: "A fast-food chain is experiencing significant delays in its delivery service. How can they improve their delivery times?"

New Product Launch Cases

These cases assess the viability of introducing a new product to the market. They require a comprehensive understanding of market demand, product development, marketing strategy, and distribution channels.

Key considerations:

1. **Market Research:** Identifying customer needs, market size, and growth trends.
2. **Product Development:** Features, benefits, differentiation, R&D.
3. **Go-to-Market Strategy:** Marketing, sales, distribution, branding.
4. **Financial Projections:** Sales forecasts, cost estimates, profitability analysis.
5. **Risk Assessment:** Competitive response, market acceptance, regulatory issues.

Example Prompt: "A company that currently sells traditional board games is considering launching a new line of mobile games. What factors should they consider?"

Brain Teasers and Guesstimates

While less common in recent years, some firms may still include brain teasers or guesstimates to test your logical thinking, ability to make reasonable assumptions, and comfort with estimation. The emphasis is less on the exact answer and more on your approach and reasoning.

Example Brain Teaser: "If you could only use a standard 12-key phone keypad, how many ways can you dial a 7-digit phone number?"

Example Guesstimate: "Estimate the number of golf balls that can fit in a Boeing 747."

Key Frameworks for Case Interviews

While specific frameworks exist for each case type (as outlined above), some overarching approaches are crucial:

1. **MECE (Mutually Exclusive, Collectively Exhaustive):** Ensure your categories and sub-points cover all possibilities without overlap.
2. **Hypothesis-Driven Approach:** Formulate an initial hypothesis and then test it with data and analysis. This demonstrates structured thinking and efficiency.
3. **Issue Tree/Decision Tree:** Visually break down a complex problem into smaller, more manageable components.
4. **Porter's Five Forces:** Useful for analyzing the competitive intensity of an industry (threat of new entrants, bargaining power of buyers, bargaining power of suppliers, threat of substitutes, rivalry among existing competitors).
5. **3 Cs (Customer, Company, Competition):** A broad framework for understanding the market landscape.
6. **4 Ps of Marketing (Product, Price, Place, Promotion):** Applicable to many cases involving product launches and strategy.

Tips for Success in Your Case Interview

Beyond understanding the question types and frameworks, several behavioral and strategic elements are vital:

1. **Listen Carefully:** Pay close attention to the interviewer's prompt and any nuances they provide.
2. **Clarify Ambiguities:** Don't be afraid to ask clarifying questions to ensure you're on the right track. "To ensure I understand, is the client's primary objective to reduce costs or increase market share?"
3. **Structure Your Thinking:** Verbally outline your approach before diving into the analysis. "I'd like to structure this by first looking at the revenue drivers, then the cost drivers, and finally, potential strategic options."
4. **Think Out Loud:** Communicate your thought process clearly and continuously. The interviewer wants to understand how you think.
5. **Be Data-Driven:** Whenever possible, request specific data points and use them to support your conclusions. Even if you have to estimate, show how you're using numbers.
6. **Quantitative Skills Matter:** Practice quick mental math, percentage calculations, and estimations.
7. **Synthesize and Recommend:** Bring your analysis together into a clear, concise, and actionable recommendation.
8. **Be Confident and Enthusiastic:** Project professionalism and genuine interest in the problem.
9. **Practice, Practice, Practice:** The more cases you work through, the more comfortable and adept you'll become. Practice with friends, career services, or through online platforms.
10. **Learn from Feedback:** After each practice case, reflect on what went well and what could be improved.

The management consulting case interview is a challenging but rewarding experience. By understanding the common question types, mastering relevant frameworks, and honing your analytical and communication skills, you can significantly increase your chances of success. Remember that the interview is a dialogue, not an interrogation. Approach it with a structured, hypothesis-driven mindset, communicate your thinking clearly, and demonstrate your ability to solve complex business problems.
