For servers, especially those acting as domain controllers, DNS servers, or critical application servers, a static IP address is crucial. If you didn't configure this during installation (though it's best to do so):

1. Open "Network and Sharing Center" from the Control Panel.
2. Click on your network adapter and select "Properties."
3. Select "Internet Protocol Version 4 (TCP/IPv4)" and click "Properties."
4. Choose "Use the following IP address" and enter your desired static IP address, subnet mask, and default

gateway.

5. Enter your preferred and alternate DNS server addresses.
If this is a domain controller, these should be the IP addresses of your domain's DNS servers (often itself).
6. Click "OK" to save the changes.

3. Windows Update

1. Open Server Manager.

5. Setting the Time Zone

2. Set the correct time zone and ensure "Synchronize with an Internet time server" is enabled and configured to a reliable time source.

6. Activating Windows Server 2012

If you skipped product key entry during installation, you must activate Windows Server 2012 to continue using it.

1. Open Server Manager.
2. Go to "Local Server."
3. Under "Computer Information," click on the "Product ID" link.
4. In the System Properties window, click "Change product key."
5. Enter your valid product key and follow the prompts.

Installing Server Roles and Features

Windows Server 2012's power lies in its ability to be configured for specific roles and functionalities. This is done through the "Add Roles and Features" wizard.

2. **Firewall Configuration:** Configure the Windows Firewall

to allow only necessary inbound and outbound traffic.

3. **User Account Control (UAC):** Understand and configure UAC settings appropriately.
4. **Regular Auditing:** Implement auditing to track access and changes to sensitive data and system configurations.
5. **Antivirus/Antimalware:** Install and maintain up-to-date antivirus and antimalware solutions.
6. **Principle of Least Privilege:** Grant users and services only the permissions they absolutely need to perform their tasks.

Remote Management Tools

For managing servers remotely, consider tools like Remote Desktop Services (RDS), PowerShell Remoting, and Server Manager's remote management capabilities.

Event Viewer

Regularly review event logs in Event Viewer to identify and troubleshoot issues, monitor security events, and gain insights into system behavior.
