step back. If they remain seated, return immediately and reward them. Gradually increase the distance and duration of the "stay" over time. If they move, gently guide them back to their original position and try again.

"Come" (Recall)

This is the most important command for safety. Start in a small, enclosed area. Get down on your puppy's level, use an excited tone, and say their name followed by "Come!" When they come to you, shower them with praise and treats. Never call your puppy to scold them, as this will make them hesitant to come when called.

"Down"

From a sit, hold a treat at your puppy's nose and slowly lower it to the ground, then slide it away from them along the floor. They should follow the treat into a down position. Mark and reward. If they stand up, try luring them again.

"Leave It"

This command teaches your puppy to ignore tempting items. Place a treat on the floor and cover it with your hand. Let your puppy sniff or paw at your hand. The moment they pull their head away, say "Yes!" and give them a different, even better treat from your other hand. Gradually progress

to leaving the treat uncovered but still under your hand. Then, eventually, let them have the treat if they ignore it for a moment. The goal is for them to disengage from the forbidden item.

Socialization: Crucial for a Well-Adjusted German Shepherd

Socialization is the process of exposing your puppy to a wide variety of sights, sounds, people, and other animals in a positive and controlled manner. This is critical for German Shepherds, who can be naturally wary or protective.

1. **Critical Period:** The most crucial socialization window for puppies is between 8 and 16 weeks old.
2. **Positive Experiences:** Ensure all introductions are positive and not overwhelming.
3. **Variety:** Introduce them to different ages, genders, and appearances of people. Introduce them to well-behaved, vaccinated adult dogs in controlled settings.

Chewing

Chewing is a natural behavior for puppies, especially during teething. The key is to redirect this energy to appropriate chew toys.

2. **"Leave It":** Use the "leave it" command for forbidden items.
3. **Supervision:** When you can't supervise, confine your puppy to their crate or a puppy-proofed area.
4. **Bitter Sprays:** For persistent chewing on inappropriate items, consider using a pet-safe bitter spray.

Nipping and Biting

Puppies explore the world with their mouths. Play biting is

normal, but it needs to be managed to prevent it from becoming an issue.

1. **Yelp:** When your puppy nips too hard, let out a sharp "Ouch!" or "Yelp!" and immediately withdraw your attention for a few seconds.
2. **Redirect:** Offer an appropriate chew toy.
3. **Time-Out:** If they continue to nip, calmly remove them from the play situation for a short time-out.
4. **Teach Bite Inhibition:** The goal is to teach them how much pressure is acceptable.

Jumping Up

Puppies often jump up to greet people. The key is to withhold attention until all four paws are on the floor.

1. **Ignore Jumping:** Turn away or walk away when your puppy jumps.
2. **Reward Calmness:** Only give attention, praise, and treats when they are calm and have all four paws on the ground.
3. **"Sit" for Greetings:** Train them to sit for greetings.
