Differentiation involves tailoring instruction to meet the diverse needs of learners within a classroom. This can manifest in various ways: differentiating content (what is taught), process (how it is taught), product (how learning is demonstrated), and learning environment. Individualization takes this a step further, creating personalized learning plans (e.g., Individualized Education Programs or IEPs) that set specific goals and objectives for each student with a disability. Regular progress monitoring is key to effective differentiation and individualization.

Positive Behavioral Interventions and Supports (PBIS)

PBIS is a framework for creating positive school cultures and improving student behavior. It emphasizes proactive strategies, teaching expected behaviors, and reinforcing positive actions. For students with disabilities, PBIS can be particularly effective in addressing challenging behaviors by identifying the function of the behavior and teaching replacement skills. Consistent reinforcement and clear expectations are crucial components.

Collaboration and Communication

Effective teaching for students with disabilities is a team sport. Collaboration among general education teachers, special education teachers, paraprofessionals, parents, and other specialists (e.g., speech therapists, occupational therapists) is essential. Explicit and Direct Instruction

For many students with disabilities, particularly those with learning disabilities or intellectual disabilities, explicit and direct instruction is highly effective. This approach involves clearly stating learning objectives, modeling the skill or concept, providing guided practice with immediate feedback, and then moving to independent practice. Breaking down complex tasks into smaller, manageable steps (task analysis) is also
