6. **Flexibility and Adaptability:** Educational environments are fluid. Be prepared to adapt targets if circumstances change or if new priorities emerge.
7. **Linking to School-Wide Objectives:** Ensure that individual TA targets contribute to the broader aims of the school, such as improving literacy rates, fostering an inclusive environment, or enhancing student well-being.
