Now that your fabric is prepped and your hook is ready, it's time to start crocheting! We'll cover a basic crochet stitch suitable for rugs, along with instructions for shaping your rug.

Basic Stitches for Fabric Rugs

While you can use various crochet stitches, the following are ideal for creating a sturdy and attractive fabric rug:

1. **Single Crochet (sc):** This creates a dense and sturdy fabric. It's the most common stitch for fabric rugs as it produces a firm surface that holds its shape well.
2. **Half Double Crochet (hdc):** Slightly taller than single crochet, hdc creates a bit more drape and a slightly less dense fabric.
3. **Double Crochet (dc):** This stitch is taller and creates a more open fabric. It can be great for a lighter-weight rug or

for creating textured patterns, but may not be as durable for high-traffic areas.

For this guide, we'll focus on the single crochet stitch, as it's excellent for beginners and creates a robust rug.

Getting Started: The Foundation Chain

Unlike traditional yarn projects, a long foundation chain with fabric can be bulky and difficult to manage. Many fabric rug patterns start with a small slip knot and then work directly into creating the first row or, more commonly, begin with a magic circle or a few single crochet stitches in a small loop to form the center of a round rug.

Crocheting a Round Rug

Round rugs are popular for their versatility and ease of construction using fabric. Here's a basic method:

1. **Start:** Create a slip knot on your hook.
2. **Round 1:** Crochet 6 single crochet stitches into a magic circle. Alternatively, chain 2 and crochet 6 single crochet stitches into the second chain from the hook. Pull the tail of the magic circle (or chain) tight to close the center. Join with a slip stitch to the first single crochet to form a ring. (6 stitches)
3. **Round 2:** Chain 1 (does not count as a stitch). Crochet 2 single crochet stitches into each stitch around. Join with a slip stitch to the first single crochet. (12 stitches)
4. **Round 3:** Chain 1. Crochet 1 single crochet in the first stitch, then 2 single crochet stitches in the next stitch.

Repeat this sequence around. Join with a slip stitch. (18 stitches)

5. **Round 4:** Chain 1. Crochet 1 single crochet in the first 2 stitches, then 2 single crochet stitches in the next stitch. Repeat this sequence around. Join with a slip stitch. (24 stitches)
6. **Subsequent Rounds:** Continue increasing in this manner, adding one more single crochet between each increase in each subsequent round. The pattern is: Chain 1, sc in the next 'X' stitches, 2 sc in the next stitch. Repeat around. The number of 'X' stitches increases by one each round (e.g., 3 sc in round 5, 4 sc in round 6, and so on).

This increase method ensures your rug lays flat. If your rug starts to cup upwards, you're not increasing enough. If it starts to ripple or ruffle excessively, you're increasing too much.

Crocheting a Rectangular or Square Rug

For a rectangular or square rug, you'll start with a foundation chain.

1. **Foundation Chain:** Crochet a foundation chain of your desired length. The number of chains will determine the width of your rug. Remember that fabric strips are thicker, so fewer chains will create a wider rug than with traditional yarn.
2. **Row 1:** Single crochet in the second chain from the hook and in each chain across. Chain 1, turn.
3. **Row 2 onwards:** Single crochet in each stitch across.

Chain 1, turn.

Continue crocheting rows until your rug reaches your desired length. The key to a straight edge is consistent tension and turning your work correctly.

Joining Fabric Strips

As you crochet, you'll inevitably run out of fabric strip. To join new strips seamlessly:

1. When you have about 6-8 inches of your current strip left, lay the end of the new strip alongside it, overlapping by about 3-4 inches.
2. Continue crocheting with both strips held together for a few stitches to secure them.
3. Once securely joined, trim the excess of the old strip.
4. You can also knot the ends together and sew them down for extra security, but this may create a slight bump.

Finishing Touches and Care for Your Fabric Rug

Once you've reached the desired size for your fabric crochet rug, it's time for the finishing touches. These steps ensure your rug looks polished and will last for years to come.

Weaving in Ends

Just like with traditional yarn, you'll have a starting tail and potentially some small ends from joining strips. Weave these

tails securely into the back of your rug using your crochet hook or a yarn needle. For fabric strips, a crochet hook can be more effective for pushing the ends through the dense fabric.

Blocking (Optional but Recommended)

Blocking helps to even out your stitches, set the shape of your rug, and make it lay flat. For fabric rugs, "wet blocking" isn't usually ideal as the fabric might stretch unevenly when wet. Instead, consider:

1. **Pinning:** Lay your rug flat on a protected surface (like a carpet or a thick blanket). Carefully pin the edges of the rug to the desired shape using rust-proof pins. Leave it to dry completely.
2. **Steam Blocking:** You can gently steam your rug using an iron held a few inches above the fabric. This can help relax the stitches and set the shape. Be cautious not to press down too hard, as this can flatten the texture.

Washing and Care Instructions

Fabric crochet rugs are generally quite durable, but care will depend on the fabrics used. For t-shirt yarn rugs:

1. **Machine Washable:** Most t-shirt yarn rugs can be machine washed on a gentle cycle with cold water.
2. **Drying:** Lay flat to dry or tumble dry on a low heat setting. Avoid high heat, as it can shrink or damage the fabric.
3. **Spot Cleaning:** For minor spills, spot clean with a mild detergent and water.

Always test a small, inconspicuous area first, especially if you've used a variety of fabrics or dyes.

Troubleshooting Common Fabric Crochet Rug Issues

Even with careful planning, you might encounter a few hiccups along the way. Here are some common issues and how to resolve them:

My Rug is Cupping/ Not Laying Flat

This usually means you need to increase your stitch count. For round rugs, add an extra increase (2 sc in one stitch) in more places in each subsequent round. For rectangular rugs, you might need to add more stitches to your foundation chain or increase your stitch count at the beginning/end of rows.

My Rug is Rippling/ Ruffling

This indicates you are increasing too much. For round rugs, reduce the number of increases or the frequency of increases in each round. For rectangular rugs, you might need to reduce the number of stitches in your foundation chain or crochet fewer stitches per row.

My Fabric Strips are Uneven

This is a common challenge with homemade fabric yarn. Try to be as consistent as possible when cutting. If you have

significant variations, you can gently stretch the thinner parts more and leave the thicker parts as they are. The natural curl of t-shirt yarn often helps to camouflage minor inconsistencies.

The Edges are Uneven

Ensure you are consistently crocheting into the last stitch of each row for rectangular rugs and turning your work correctly. For round rugs, consistent tension and correct increase placement are key. Don't be afraid to "fudge" a stitch or two at the end if necessary to even out the edge, and then weave in any loose ends.

Beyond the Basics: Advanced Techniques and Ideas

Once you've mastered the basic technique, the world of fabric crochet rugs opens up to endless creative possibilities.

Varying Textures and Stitches

Experiment with different stitches like the half-double crochet or even a Tunisian crochet technique for a unique textured rug. Combining stitches can create interesting patterns. For example, alternating single crochet and double crochet rows can create a subtle striped effect.

Colorwork and Patterning

Don't be afraid to mix and match fabric colors. You can create

stripes by simply changing fabric colors at the end of a row or round. For more intricate patterns, you can explore color-blocking techniques or even create simple motifs by changing colors strategically.

Adding Embellishments

Once your rug is complete, consider adding embellishments. Fringe made from leftover fabric strips, pom-poms, or even braided fabric accents can add a personalized touch.

Different Rug Shapes

Beyond rounds and rectangles, try creating oval rugs by adjusting the increase points in round patterns, or even freeform rugs that have an organic, abstract shape. The flexibility of fabric crochet allows for almost any shape you can imagine.
