Trial Division: The Basic Approach

The most straightforward method for checking if a number 'n' is prime is **trial division**. This involves dividing 'n' by every integer from 2 up to the square root of 'n'. If any of these integers divide 'n' evenly, then 'n' is

composite. If none do, then 'n' is prime.

Sieves of Eratosthenes: Finding Multiple Primes

For finding a list of prime numbers up to a certain limit, the **Sieve of Eratosthenes** is an ancient and elegant algorithm. Developed by the Greek mathematician Eratosthenes, it works by iteratively marking as composite the multiples of each prime, starting with 2. The numbers that remain unmarked are the primes.

Imagine a list of numbers from 2 up to your limit. 1. Start with 2, the first prime. Mark all its multiples (4, 6, 8, ...) as composite. 2. Move to the next unmarked number, which is 3.
