MAC Address Filtering

While not foolproof, MAC address filtering can add an extra layer of security. It allows you to create a list of authorized devices based on their unique MAC addresses. However, MAC addresses can be spoofed, so this should not be your sole security measure.

Regularly Update Router Firmware

Router manufacturers periodically release firmware updates to patch security vulnerabilities and improve performance. Check your router's administration panel for firmware update options and install them as they become available.
