Species like the Eastern Rosella (**Platycercus eximius**) with its red, yellow, blue, and black markings, and the Crimson Rosella (**Platycercus elegans**) with its dominant crimson colouration, are particularly striking. They inhabit a range of environments across eastern and southern Australia, feeding on seeds, fruits, and nectar. Their vibrant colours make them a photographer's delight

and a beautiful addition to the list of **Australian native birds**.

Waterbirds and Waders: Life Along Australia's Coasts and Wetlands

Australia's extensive coastline, numerous rivers, lakes, and ephemeral wetlands support a diverse array of waterbirds and waders, each adapted to its specific aquatic environment.

Pelicans: Majestic Scavengers

Their elaborate courtship displays, involving fanned tails, are a spectacle in themselves, found in the rainforests of southeastern Australia. Their unique vocal talents make them a wonder among **Australian songbirds**.

Honeyeaters: Pollinators of the Bush

The Honeyeater family is one of the most diverse and widespread groups of birds in Australia. Their secretive nature makes them a challenge to spot, but their presence contributes to the complexity of the Australian terrestrial ecosystem. Understanding the habitat requirements for these ground-dwelling birds is vital for their conservation.
