The dramatic scenery, including the iconic Mount Ngauruhoe (often referred to as Mount Doom), is a photographer's dream. Even if you're not an avid hiker, shorter walks within the park offer stunning vistas and a glimpse into the raw power of nature. Remember to check weather conditions, as the alpine environment can change rapidly.

Waitomo Caves: Glowworm Galaxies

Venture underground into the Waitomo Caves and prepare to be mesmerized by a celestial spectacle. Thousands of tiny glowworms adorn the cave ceilings, casting an ethereal glow that mimics a starry night sky. The most popular way to experience this is via a silent boat ride through the Glowworm Grotto, where you glide through the darkness, looking up at the twinkling constellations of glowworms. For the more adventurous, black water rafting tours offer an exhilarating way to explore the caves, tubing through underground rivers and abseiling down waterfalls. It's a unique and unforgettable natural wonder.

Auckland: The City of Sails
