3. Intermediate result: 12×10^5
4. Adjust coefficient: $12 = 1.2 \times 10^1$
5. Final result: $(1.2 \times 10^1) \times 10^5 = 1.2 \times 10^6$

Division

To divide two numbers in scientific notation, divide their coefficients and subtract the exponent of the divisor from the exponent of the dividend:

$$(a \times 10^n) / (b \times 10^m) = (a / b) \times 10^{n-m}$$
