leading small projects, and contributing to the company's overall growth. Emphasize your desire to grow your skills, take on more responsibility, and make a significant contribution. Avoid stating you want to be the CEO unless it's a very small startup and you've done extensive research to back it up. Focus on development, learning, and impact.

3. "How do you handle working under pressure or with tight deadlines?"

4. "Why should we hire you?" (Or: "What makes you the best candidate for this role?")

7. "If you were an animal, what would you be and why?"

9. "How do you stay up-to-date with industry trends?"

I recently attended a webinar on [Emerging Technology] and have been exploring how we could implement it in our [Department/Project]." Demonstrating a genuine passion for learning and staying informed is key.

10. "What is your greatest professional achievement?"

Quantify the impact of your achievement with numbers or percentages whenever possible. Explain the challenges you overcame and the skills you utilized. This answer should leave a lasting impression of your capabilities and your ability to make a difference.
