This deconstruction process can be painful but often leads to a re-engagement with faith on more authentic and personally meaningful terms, forming the basis for this new Christianity. The rise of the "nones" – individuals who check "none" on religious affiliation surveys – highlights this trend.

Globalization and the Internet
