The famous statue of Poseidon (or possibly Zeus) from Cape Artemision, though partially reconstructed and housed in the National Archaeological Museum of Athens, has inspired countless smaller works. The British Museum's collection features bronzes and marbles showing Poseidon with his trident, a symbol of his dominion over the watery depths. His often tempestuous nature, reflecting the unpredictable power of the sea, is also conveyed through dynamic poses and fierce expressions in various artifacts. Hades: Ruler of the Underworld

Though often depicted as a more somber and less outwardly worshipped deity, Hades, god of the underworld, makes appearances in scenes of mythology, particularly those involving journeys to the afterlife. The British Museum's collection of funerary art and mythological scenes on sarcophagi and pottery often hints at his domain. While direct, heroic representations are rarer, his presence is felt in narratives of death and the underworld, a significant aspect of Greek belief. The Kermes sarcophagus, though Roman, showcases a Roman interpretation of mythological scenes, which often included Hades or Pluto.

Hera: Queen of the Gods and Marriage

Hera, Zeus's wife and sister, is the goddess of marriage, women, childbirth, and family. Her iconography often portrays her as a regal and matronly figure. Apollo, the god of music, poetry, prophecy, healing, and light, is a beloved and widely depicted deity. The British Museum boasts several fine examples of his worship and artistic representation. Dionysus: Wine, Festivity, and Ecstasy

Dionysus, the god of wine, fertility, festivity, ecstasy, and theater, is a god of liberation and primal energies. His iconography is rich and varied, often featuring him crowned with ivy or grapevines, holding a thyrsus (a pinecone-tipped staff), and accompanied by satyrs, maenads, and other revelers. The British Museum's collection includes numerous kraters, amphorae, and kylixes decorated with scenes of Dionysian revelry, showcasing his exuberant and often wild nature.
