However, quadratic equations have a more complex relationship with the number of solutions. They can have two distinct real solutions, one repeated real solution, or two complex conjugate solutions.

The Role of the Discriminant

The key to determining the number of real solutions for a quadratic equation lies in its **discriminant**, which is the expression under the square root in the quadratic formula: $\Delta = b^2 - 4ac$.

1. If $\Delta > 0$, there are **two distinct real solutions**.

Systems of Equations with a Unique Intersection

Beyond single equations, the concept of "one solution" extends to **systems of equations**. A system of equations is a set of two or more equations that are considered together. The solution to a system is a set of values for the variables that satisfies all equations in the system simultaneously.

Graphical Interpretation: The Intersection Point

The **unique solution** to this system is the ordered pair (3, 2). This means that when $x = 3$ and $y = 2$, both Equation 1 ($3 + 2 = 5$) and Equation 2 ($2(3) - 2 = 6 - 2 = 4$) are true. Graphically, the lines represented by these equations would intersect at the point (3, 2).
