For instance, one student identifies a word, and another writes it down.

3. Individual Accountability: Ensuring Each Student Contributes

While the group works together, each student must be held responsible for their own learning and participation. This prevents "free-riders" and ensures that all students are actively engaged. Methods include: * **Individual Checks:** Asking individual students to explain their part of the group's work. * **Written or Drawn Products:** Having each student individually complete a part of the overall task or reflect on their learning. * **Observation and Assessment:** The teacher actively observes and notes individual contributions and understanding.

4. Interpersonal Skills Development: Explicitly Teaching Collaboration

Subject: Mathematics

Interdependence: The group is given a pattern to replicate or extend using pattern blocks. They must discuss which shapes to use

and where to place them to match the pattern. * **Individual Accountability:** Each student might be responsible for placing a certain number of blocks or completing a specific segment of the pattern. * **Roles:** Pattern Designer, Shape Finder, Block Placer, Pattern Checker. * **Processing:** "How did you know which shape came next?" They might decide together on the symbols to use for sun, clouds, rain, etc. * **Individual Accountability:** Each member of the group might have a role in observing a specific aspect (e.g., temperature, wind) or drawing the weather symbol. * **Roles:** Sky Watcher, Wind Reader, Temperature Taker, Weather Artist. *

Processing: "What did you notice about the weather today?" "How did you decide which symbol to draw?" * **Activity: Plant Life Cycle Exploration** * **Objective:** Students will learn and sequence the
