Step 3: Position the Tile on the Cutter

Making Straight Cuts

Cutting Angles and Miters

For angled cuts, especially for corners or decorative borders, you'll need to adjust your approach. Many manual tile cutters have adjustable angle guides. Set the guide to your desired angle (e.g., 45 degrees). Position the

tile against the guide and score as usual. For precise miters, especially on harder tiles, a wet saw is often the preferred tool, as it offers greater control and accuracy for these complex cuts.

Cutting Notches and Outlets

When you need to cut around obstacles like electrical outlets or plumbing fixtures, you'll need to create notches. This is where a manual tile cutter might struggle. For small notches, you might be able to score and break in sections, but this is often imprecise. A more effective method for notches and outlets involves using a wet saw with a plunge cut capability or an angle grinder with a diamond blade. These tools allow you to cut out specific shapes and dimensions.

Cutting Curves and Circles

Cutting curves and circles is best achieved with a wet saw. The diamond blade can be guided to follow a drawn pattern, allowing for intricate shapes. Manual tile cutters are not designed for this type of cut.

Using a Wet Saw for Tile Cutting

For harder tiles, complex cuts, or when seeking the highest level of precision, a wet saw is an invaluable tool. They are particularly useful for porcelain, stone, and glass

tiles.

Setting Up Your Wet Saw

Ensure the water reservoir is filled to the recommended level. Position the saw on a stable, level surface, ideally outdoors or in a well-ventilated area due to the water and potential for a small amount of splashback. Wear safety glasses and gloves.

Cutting with a Wet Saw

Mark your cut line on the tile. Gently feed the tile into the spinning diamond blade, allowing the water to lubricate and cool the blade. Guide the tile at a steady pace. Avoid forcing the tile. Maintain Your Tools

A sharp scoring wheel on a manual cutter is essential. If it becomes dull, it will struggle to score the tile effectively, leading to uneven breaks. Similarly, ensure your wet saw blade is clean and properly seated.

Cut Away from Yourself

Always ensure that when you are scoring and breaking, you are doing so away from your body and any exposed skin. This minimizes the risk of injury from unexpected slips or sharp tile edges.

Consider Tile Thickness and Hardness

Thicker tiles often require more pressure to score and break. Very hard tiles, like dense porcelain or some

natural stones, may be difficult or impossible to cut with a basic manual cutter and might necessitate a wet saw or a heavy-duty manual cutter with a more robust scoring wheel.

Don't Rush the Process

Patience is a virtue in tiling. Take your time with measurements, scoring, and breaking. Rushing often leads to mistakes that are difficult to rectify.

Troubleshooting Common Tile Cutting Problems

Even with careful planning, you might encounter issues. Here's how to address them:

1. **Jagged Breaks:** This often happens when the score line isn't deep enough, the tile is unevenly supported, or excessive force is used during breaking. Ensure a strong, single score and a firm, quick snap.
2. **Tile Chips or Cracks During Scoring:** This can indicate a flaw in the tile itself, or that you're applying too much pressure unevenly. Try a gentler, more consistent scoring pass.
3. **Scoring Wheel Not Cutting Deeply:** The scoring wheel may be dull or damaged. Inspect it, and replace it if necessary.
4. **Tile Won't Break:** Ensure the score line is directly

under the breaking foot and that you're applying enough direct downward pressure. For very hard tiles, a manual cutter might not be sufficient.
