Use Reference Photos

This cannot be stressed enough. No artist, no matter how skilled, can draw convincing mouths without studying real ones. Pay attention to how the lips interact with the surrounding skin.

Observe the Play of Light and Shadow

Light is your best friend in creating form. Where does the light source come from? This will dictate where your highlights and shadows fall. The upper lip is often in shadow, while the lower lip catches more light. The corners of the mouth are almost always darker.

Don't Draw a Line for the Mouth

Avoid drawing a single, harsh line for the mouth. Instead, think of it as a separation between two rounded forms – the upper and lower lips. The "line" is actually a subtle shadow or a change in value that indicates this separation.

Consider the Surrounding Skin

The mouth doesn't exist in a vacuum. The skin around the mouth, including the chin and the area below the nose (the philtrum), plays a crucial role in defining the mouth's shape and expression. Shadows and wrinkles in these areas will enhance the realism of your drawing.

Practice Different Angles and Perspectives

Mouths look different from various angles. Practice drawing them in profile, three-quarter view, and from slightly above or below. This will train your eye to see the underlying three-dimensional form.

Experiment with Different Mediums

While this guide focuses on pencil drawing, the principles apply to other mediums like charcoal, pastels, or digital art. Each medium offers unique ways to create smooth blends and sharp highlights, allowing for different stylistic interpretations of the mouth.

Common Mistakes and How to Avoid Them

Overly Defined Outlines

As mentioned, avoid drawing a thick, solid line for the mouth. The vermilion border is a transition, not a harsh boundary. Rely on shading and subtle value changes to define the lips.

If your shading looks flat, you're likely not considering the three-dimensional form of the lips. Ensure your shading follows the curves of the lips and accurately represents how light wraps around them.

Incorrect Proportions

The width of the mouth in relation to the width of the face, and the relative fullness of the upper and lower lips, are crucial for believable proportions. Always compare your drawing to your reference or to general facial proportion guides.

Ignoring the Philtrum

Forgetting to include the philtrum can make the area between the nose and the upper lip look unnatural and flat. This subtle detail adds significant realism.
