Repeat Rounds 3-6 until the body of your hat measures approximately 6-7 inches from the brim (or until you reach your desired height before starting the crown

decreases).

Step 4: Decreasing for the Crown

This is where we start shaping the top of the beanie to create a rounded crown.

Pattern Notes:

- 1. Round 1 (Decrease Round):** Ch 1. *Sc2tog (single crochet two together – insert hook into next st, yarn over, pull up a loop, insert hook into next st, yarn over, pull up a loop, yarn over, pull through all loops on hook). 4. **Round 4:** Ch 3 (counts as your first dc). Work 1 dc in each of the next 2 stitches. *Work 2 dc in the next stitch, 1 dc in each of the next 2 stitches.* Repeat from * to * around. Join with a slip stitch to the top of the ch-3. (48 stitches)
5. **Round 5 and beyond:** Continue increasing in this pattern. You'll increase in a new stitch every few stitches in each subsequent round. The general rule is to add 12 stitches per round to maintain a flat circle. For a standard adult beanie, you'll typically continue increasing until your circle measures about 6-7 inches in diameter. Use stitch markers to keep track of where your increases should occur.

Tip: If your circle starts to ruffle or cup, you're

increasing too much or too little. Check your stitch count against the pattern or refer to online charts for the correct number of stitches for a flat circle of a given size.

Step 2: The Body - Crocheting Straight Up

Once your flat circle is the desired size, you'll stop increasing and start crocheting rounds of your chosen stitch (e.g., double crochet) without any increases. This is where the beanie starts to grow in height.

1. **Round [Number of last increase round + 1]:** Ch 3 (counts as your first dc). Work 1 dc in each stitch around. Join with a slip stitch to the top of the ch-3.
2. **Subsequent Rounds:** Repeat the previous round until your beanie reaches the desired length. To determine the length, measure from the top of the crown down to where you want the brim to start. For an average adult, this is usually around 7-9 inches.

Step 3: The Brim - Adding a Finished Edge

The brim provides a neat finish and ensures the beanie stays snug on your head. You have several options here:

1. **Ribbed Brim (using Back Loop Only):** This is a popular and effective method.

1. Switch to a smaller crochet hook if desired for a tighter brim.
2. Ch 2 (does not count as a stitch). Work 1 half double crochet in the back loop only of each stitch around. Join with a slip stitch.
3. Repeat this round until the brim is the desired height. The back loop only technique creates a stretchy, ribbed effect.
2. **Single Crochet Brim:** For a simple and sturdy brim.
 1. Ch 1 (does not count as a stitch). Work 1 single crochet in each stitch around. Join with a slip stitch.
 2. Repeat this round for desired brim height.
3. **Double Crochet Brim:** A taller, softer brim.
 1. Ch 3 (counts as your first dc). Work 1 dc in each stitch around. Join with a slip stitch.
 2. Repeat this round for desired brim height.

Tip: Many people fold the brim up for extra warmth and style. Adjust the height of your brim to accommodate this.

Step 4: Finishing Off - Weaving in Ends

Once your beanie is the desired size and you've completed the brim, it's time to finish off.

1. Cut the yarn, leaving a tail of about 6-8 inches.
2. Pull the tail through the last loop on your hook to secure the stitch.
3. Thread the yarn tail onto your yarn needle.
4. Carefully weave the yarn tail back and forth through

the stitches on the wrong side of your beanie. This will secure the end and prevent it from unraveling.

5. Trim any excess yarn.
6. Repeat this process for any other yarn tails (e.g., from your starting magic ring).

Troubleshooting Common Crochet Beanie Issues

Even experienced crocheters encounter hiccups. Here are solutions to some common problems:

My Hat is Too Small/Too Large

This usually stems from an incorrect gauge (how many stitches and rows fit into a specific measurement) or an error in your stitch count during the increase rounds. If your hat is too small, try using a larger hook or redoing the increase rounds, ensuring you have the correct stitch count for each round. If it's too large, use a smaller hook or fewer increase rounds.

My Hat is Cupping or Ruffling

Cupping (the edge curling upwards) means you need more stitches per round; it's not expanding enough.

Ruffling (the edge waving or flaring out) means you have too many stitches per round; it's expanding too much.

Adjust your increase pattern accordingly.

My Seams Aren't Neat

When joining rounds, ensure you're joining into the correct starting chain or stitch. Using a stitch marker to mark the first stitch of each round can also help maintain straight lines and neater joins.

My Yarn is Tangling

This can happen with certain types of yarn or if your yarn ball is wound too loosely. Try winding your yarn into a cake or using a yarn bowl to keep it contained and prevent tangles.
