This is where the three layers become one functional quilt. For a simple patchwork quilt, straight-line quilting is perfect.

Choosing Your Quilting Design

For beginners, simple straight lines are the most manageable and can look very effective.

1. **Stitch-in-the-Ditch:** Quilting directly in the seams between your patchwork blocks. This creates a subtle, textured effect.
2. **Straight Lines:** Quilting parallel lines across the quilt, either horizontally, vertically, or diagonally. You can space these lines a few inches apart.

How to Quilt Your Simple Quilt

1. **Start in the Middle:** Begin quilting from the center of your quilt and work your way outwards. This helps to prevent the fabric from shifting and creating gathers.
2. **Use a Walking Foot:** A walking foot (also called an Even Feed Foot) on your sewing machine is highly recommended for quilting. It feeds all three layers of fabric evenly, preventing puckering.

and ensuring smooth stitching.

3. **Stitch-in-the-Ditch Example:** Sew along the seam lines of your patchwork blocks. As you come to an intersection, stop with your needle down, pivot your fabric, and continue sewing along the next seam.
4. **Straight Line Example:** Use your quilting ruler and a fabric marker to draw a few parallel lines on your quilt top as a guide. Sew along these lines with your walking foot.
5. **Work in Sections:** You may find it easier to quilt one section or row at a time, especially if your quilt is large and doesn't fit easily under your machine's throat.

The Finishing Touch: Binding Your Quilt

Binding is the strip of fabric that encloses the raw edges of your quilt, giving it a neat and professional finish.

Preparing Your Binding Strips

1. **Calculate Width:** For a standard binding, cut your fabric strips 2.25 inches wide.
2. **Cut Lengthwise:** Cut strips along the length of your fabric (selvage to selvage). You'll need enough length to go all the way around your quilt plus about 10-12 inches for joining and finishing.
3. **Join Strips:** If you need to join strips, place them right sides together at a 90-degree angle and sew a diagonal seam. This creates a less bulky join. Press the seams open.

Attaching the Binding

1. **Fold in Half:** Fold each binding strip in half lengthwise, wrong sides together, and press.
2. **Start Sewing:** Begin sewing the raw edges of the binding to the raw edge of the quilt top. Start about 6-8 inches from a corner, leaving a tail of binding hanging free.
3. **Mitered Corners:** As you approach a corner, stop sewing 1/4 inch before the corner. Fold the binding up away from the quilt, creating a diagonal fold at the corner. Then fold it down along the next edge of the quilt. This creates a neat "mitered" corner. Pin in place.
4. **Continue Sewing:** Continue sewing along the edge, starting again at the folded edge of the corner.
5. **Joining the Ends:** When you return to your starting point, you'll need to join the two ends of the binding. Overlap the binding tails, ensuring you have enough length to create a neat join. Trim any excess fabric and sew the tails together with a diagonal seam.

Finishing the Binding

1. **Fold to the Back:** Once the binding is sewn to the front of the quilt, fold it over to the back of the quilt, encasing the raw edge.
2. **Secure the Binding:** You can hand-stitch the binding to the back of the quilt for a nearly invisible finish, or you can machine-stitch it for a quicker finish. If machine-stitching, ensure you catch the folded edge of the binding.

Caring for Your Handmade Quilt

A handmade quilt is an investment. With proper care, it will provide warmth and comfort for generations.

Washing and Drying

1. **First Wash:** For the first wash, it's advisable to wash your quilt separately in cold water on a gentle cycle with a mild detergent. This will help to set the colors and remove any excess dye.
2. **Subsequent Washes:** For subsequent washes, you can wash your quilt in cold water on a gentle cycle with a mild detergent.
3. **Drying:** Air drying is the best option for preserving the fibers and preventing shrinkage. If you must use a dryer, use the lowest heat setting or a no-heat setting.

Storage

Store your quilt in a cool, dry, and dark place, away from direct sunlight and humidity. Cedar chests or breathable fabric bags are excellent for storage.
