5. The Wedge: Splitting and Securing

Hands-On Simple Machines Experiments for Budding Scientists

Experiment 1: The Mighty Lever – Seesaw Science

Concept: Demonstrating the mechanical advantage of levers.

Materials: A ruler, a pencil or marker (as a fulcrum), and a few small objects of varying weights (e.g., coins, erasers, small toys).

Procedure:

1. Place the ruler across the pencil (the fulcrum).
2. Place one object on one end of the ruler. This is the load.

Experiment 2: Wheel and Axle – The Cardboard Car Challenge

Experiment 3: Pulley Power – Lifting with String and Pulleys
