2. There are no pieces between the king and the rook.
3. The king is not currently in check.
4. The king does not pass through or land on a square that is under attack.

To castle, the king moves two squares towards the rook, and the rook then jumps over the king to the adjacent square.

Pawn Promotion: A Humble Pawn's Big Reward

If a pawn successfully reaches the opposite end of the board (the eighth rank), it can be promoted to any other piece of the same color (except a king). This usually means promoting to a queen because it's the most powerful piece, but you can choose a rook, bishop, or knight.

En Passant: A Sneaky Pawn Capture

This is a more advanced pawn capture. If an opponent's pawn moves two squares forward from its starting position and lands next to your pawn (on the same rank), you have the option, on your very next move, to capture that opponent's pawn as if it had only moved one square forward. Your pawn moves to the square the opponent's pawn passed over, and the opponent's pawn is removed. This move is only available immediately after the two-square pawn move.

Basic Chess Strategy and Principles for Beginners

Knowing how the pieces move is one thing; knowing how to use them effectively is another. For "chess dummies," a few fundamental strategic concepts can make a world of difference.

Control the Center

The central squares of the chessboard (d4, d5, e4, e5) are strategically vital. Pieces placed in the center control more squares on the board, giving you a tactical advantage. Try to develop your pieces towards the center early in the game.

Develop Your Pieces

Don't leave your pieces on their starting squares for too long. Bring them out into the game, especially your knights and bishops. This increases your attacking and defensive capabilities. Aim to develop minor pieces (knights and bishops) before major pieces (rooks and queen).

King Safety

As mentioned, the king is the most important piece. Once you've developed your minor pieces and castled, your king is generally much safer tucked away behind a wall of pawns.

Piece Value: A Rough Guide

While not a strict rule, understanding the relative value of pieces can help you make better decisions about trades. A common approximate point system is:

1. Pawn: 1 point
2. Knight: 3 points
3. Bishop: 3 points
4. Rook: 5 points
5. Queen: 9 points
6. King: Infinite (as losing it means losing the game)

Generally, you don't want to trade a more valuable piece

for a less valuable one unless there's a clear tactical advantage.

Think Ahead (Even Just One Move)

Before you make a move, ask yourself: "What is my opponent trying to do?" "What are the threats?" "What does my move achieve?" Even thinking one move ahead and anticipating your opponent's response can prevent many blunders.

Your First Games: Learning by Doing

The best way to truly learn how to play chess is to play! Don't be discouraged by losses. Every game is a learning opportunity.

Play Against Friends or Family

Start with people who are also learning or are patient teachers. This is a low-pressure environment to practice what you've learned.

Online Chess Platforms

There are numerous online chess platforms (like Chess.com, Lichess.org) that offer a chance to play against AI opponents of varying skill levels or against

other players worldwide. They also provide valuable learning resources, tutorials, and analysis tools.

Review Your Games

After a game, take a few minutes to look back at the moves. Did you make any obvious mistakes? Could you have defended better? Did you miss any opportunities? Many online platforms offer game analysis that can highlight your blunders.
