Author's Last Name, First Name. "Title of Article." *Title of Journal/Database*, vol. Volume Number, no. Issue Number, Year, pp. Page Numbers. *Database Name*, DOI or URL.

Example:

Chen, Li. "Impact of Renewable Energy on Local Economies." *Journal of Environmental Studies*, vol. 25, no. 3, 2022, pp.

112-128. *Academic Search Premier*,
doi:10.1080/12345678.2022.987654.

Note for middle school: Focus on getting the core elements right. If a DOI is complex, a stable URL is often acceptable, but always follow your teacher's specific instructions.

5. **Website Article:**

Author's Last Name, First Name (if available). "Title of Article."
Title of Website, Publisher (if different from website title), Date of
Publication (Day Month Year). URL.

Example:

National Geographic. "Amazing Animal Adaptations." *National Geographic Kids*, 20 Mar. 2023.
kids.nationalgeographic.com/animals/.

Example (with author):

Davis, Emily. "How to Grow a Garden." *Gardening Tips Today*, 5
Apr. 2023. www.gardeningtipstoday.com/how-to-grow.

Important: Always include the date you accessed the website,
especially if the content might change.

Example (with access date):

Davis, Emily. "How to Grow a Garden." *Gardening Tips Today*, 5
Apr. 2023. Accessed 15 May 2023.
www.gardeningtipstoday.com/how-to-grow.

6. **Primary Sources:** Citing primary sources, such as historical documents or interviews, follows similar principles. For an interview, it might be:

Interviewee Name. Personal Interview. Day Month Year.

For a historical document (e.g., a letter):

Sender Name. Letter to Recipient Name. Day Month Year.

Location of Document.

Formatting the Works Cited Page

Beyond the individual citations, the overall presentation of the Works Cited page is crucial:

1. **Title:** Center the title "Works Cited" at the top of the page.
2. **Alphabetical Order:** Entries are listed alphabetically by the author's last name. If a source has no author, alphabetize by the first significant word of the title (ignoring "A," "An," or "The").
3. **Hanging Indent:** The first line of each citation is flush with the left margin. Subsequent lines of the same citation are indented by 0.5 inches (forming a "hanging indent").
4. **Double Spacing:** The entire Works Cited page should be double-spaced, both within and between entries.
