His funeral was attended by a few close friends and admirers, a stark contrast to the immense impact his work would have in the future.

Initially dismissed as a madman or a minor eccentric, William Blake's influence has grown exponentially since his death. The Pre-Raphaelites, the Symbolists, and later the Surrealists all drew inspiration from his visionary art and his embrace of the subconscious. His poems have been set to music by composers like Ralph Vaughan Williams and Benjamin Britten, and his distinctive visual style has influenced countless artists and designers. Today, William Blake is recognized as a pivotal figure in Romanticism, a revolutionary artist who dared to challenge conventions and reveal the divine within the ordinary. His enduring legacy lies in his unwavering belief in the power of imagination and his prescient vision of a world where spirit, art, and life are inseparably intertwined.
