This offers more control for the photographer. **Royalty-Free** licenses, often associated with stock photography, allow for unlimited use of an image after a single purchase, though the photographer still retains copyright.

Model and Property Releases

For images featuring identifiable people or private property, model and property releases are often required, especially for commercial use. These are legal documents granting permission for the use of likeness and property. Ignorance of these can lead to legal trouble.
