Turn by Turn: The Flow of Gameplay

The Pokémon TCG is played in turns, with players alternating between their own. A turn consists of several phases:

1. Starting the Turn:

5. **Retreat Your Active Pokémon:** If your Active Pokémon has enough Energy attached to cover its Retreat Cost, you can pay that cost (by discarding the required Energy cards) to move it to the Bench. You can then choose another Pokémon from your Bench to become your new Active Pokémon.

4. Attack Phase:

1. If your Active Pokémon has enough Energy attached to use one of its attacks, you can declare that you are attacking.
2. Announce which attack you are using and pay its Energy cost by discarding the required Energy cards from your Pokémon.
3. If your opponent's Active Pokémon has a Weakness that matches the attacking Pokémon's type, the damage is doubled. If it has Resistance, the damage is reduced.
4. Deal the calculated damage to your opponent's Active Pokémon using Damage Counters.
5. If your Pokémon is Knocked Out, the opponent takes one of your Prize Cards.
6. If the defending Pokémon is Knocked Out, the opponent takes one of your Prize Cards.

5. End Phase:

1. If your Active Pokémon has any Status Conditions, apply their effects (e.g., poison damage).
2. Your turn ends.

Winning the Game: How to Achieve Victory

There are three primary ways to win a Pokémon TCG match:

1. **Knock Out All of Your Opponent's Prize Cards:** This is the most common way to win. When you Knock Out an opponent's Pokémon, you take one of your face-down Prize Cards. If you manage to take all six Prize Cards, you win the game.
