2. **Basting Spray:** A temporary adhesive spray can be used to hold the layers together. Follow the manufacturer's instructions carefully.
3. **Hand Basting:** Using a long, running stitch with a needle and thread.

For beginners, safety pins are often the easiest and most secure method.

Quilting the Layers

This is where you stitch through all three layers to secure them and add decorative elements. For a simple quilt, straight-line quilting is perfect. You can:

1. **Stitch-in-the-Ditch:** Sew along the existing seam lines of your patchwork. This is a subtle way to add quilting.
2. **Straight Lines:** Sew parallel lines across your quilt, either horizontally, vertically, or diagonally. Use your walking foot for best results. You can mark your lines with a fabric marker or use the lines on your walking foot or ruler as a guide.

Start quilting from the center of the quilt and work your way outwards to minimize puckering.

Finishing Your Quilt: The Binding Process

The final step is to bind your quilt. Binding is the fabric strip that encases the raw edges of the quilt, giving it a clean and finished look.

Preparing Your Binding Strips

You'll need to cut strips of fabric for your binding. A common width is 2.5 inches. For straight-grained binding, you'll cut strips across the width of your fabric. For mitered corners, you'll sew your strips together at a 45-degree angle to create one continuous strip long enough to go around your entire quilt, plus an extra 10-12 inches for joining. Press your binding strips in half lengthwise, wrong sides together.

Attaching the Binding

Align the raw edge of your folded binding strip with the raw edge of your quilt top. Using your sewing machine and a 1/4-inch seam allowance, stitch the binding to the front of the quilt. Stop sewing about 1/4 inch from each corner. Fold the binding strip up and away from the quilt, then fold it back down, creating a neat mitered corner. Continue sewing the binding around the entire perimeter of the quilt.

When you get back to where you started, join the ends of your binding strip neatly. Then, fold the binding over to the back of the quilt, enclosing the raw edges. You can hand-stitch the binding to the backing for a traditional finish, or machine-stitch it down for a quicker result.

Caring for Your Handmade Quilt

Once your simple quilt is complete, you'll want to ensure it lasts for years to come. Follow these care instructions:

1. **Washing:** Wash your quilt in cold water on a gentle cycle. Use a mild detergent. If you used a variety of colorful fabrics, consider using a color catcher sheet for the first few washes.
2. **Drying:** It's best to air dry your quilt to prevent shrinkage and damage. If you must use a dryer, use a low heat setting and remove the quilt while still slightly damp.
3. **Storage:** Store your quilt in a cool, dry place, away from direct sunlight. Avoid plastic bags, as they can trap moisture.
