The Building Blocks: Greatest Common Factor (GCF)

3. Variable (y) : The powers are (y^2) , (y^3) , (y^2) . The lowest power is (y^2) .
4. $GCF = (6xy^2)$

Now, divide each term by $(6xy^2)$:

1. $(12x^3y^2 / 6xy^2 = 2x^2)$

$$2. \quad (18x^2y^3 / 6xy^2 = 3xy)$$

$$3. \quad (-6xy^2 / 6xy^2 = -1)$$

Therefore, the factored expression is $(6xy^2(2x^2 + 3xy - 1))$.

Factoring Polynomials with Two Terms (Binomials)

Binomials, expressions with two terms, often lend themselves to specific factoring patterns. Recognizing these patterns is key to efficient factoring.

Difference of Squares: $(a^2 - b^2)$

This is one of the most recognizable factoring formulas. It states that the difference of two perfect squares can be factored into the product of their sum and difference.

Formula: $(a^2 - b^2 = (a + b)(a - b))$

Sum of Cubes: $(a^3 + b^3)$

The sum of two perfect cubes can be factored into a binomial and a trinomial.

Formula: $a^3 + b^3 = (a + b)(a^2 - ab + b^2)$

Steps:

1. Ensure both terms are perfect cubes. This means they can be expressed as something cubed (e.g., x^3 , 8 , $27y^6$).

1. $\sqrt[3]{x^3}$ is x , so $\sqrt[3]{a} = x$.
2. $\sqrt[3]{8}$ is 2 , so $\sqrt[3]{b} = 2$.
3. Factored form: $(x + 2)(x^2 - x(2) + 2^2) = (x + 2)(x^2 - 2x + 4)$

Difference of Cubes: $(a^3 - b^3)$

Similar to the sum of cubes, the difference of two perfect cubes has a specific factorization.

Formula: $a^3 - b^3 = (a - b)(a^2 + ab + b^2)$

Steps:

1. Ensure both terms are perfect cubes.
2. Identify $\sqrt[3]{a}$ and $\sqrt[3]{b}$.

Example: Factor $(27y^6 - 1)$

Factoring Polynomials with Three Terms (Trinomials)

Trinomials are expressions with three terms, and their factoring methods depend on their form, particularly the coefficient of the squared term.

Trinomials of the Form $(x^2 + bx + c)$

This is perhaps the most common type of trinomial encountered. The goal is to find two numbers that multiply to (c) and add up to (b) .

Steps:

1. Identify the coefficient (b) (the coefficient of the middle term) and the constant term (c) .
2. Find two numbers that multiply to (c) . List pairs of factors of (c) .

Example: Factor $(x^2 + 7x + 10)$

1. $(b = 7)$, $(c = 10)$.
2. Factors of 10: $(1, 10)$, $(2, 5)$, $(-1, -10)$, $(-2, -5)$.
3. Which pair adds to 7? $2 + 5 = 7$.
4. Factored form: $((x + 2)(x + 5))$

Example with negative (c) : Factor $(x^2 - 2x - 15)$

1. $(b = -2), (c = -15)$.
2. Factors of -15: (1, -15), (-1, 15), (3, -5), (-3, 5).
3. Which pair adds to -2? $3 + (-5) = -2$.
4. Factored form: $((x + 3)(x - 5))$

Trinomials of the Form $(ax^2 + bx + c)$ (where $(a \neq 1)$)

When the leading coefficient (a) is not 1, the process becomes slightly more involved. Several methods exist, but the "ac method" (or grouping) is widely used.

The ac Method:

1. Multiply (a) and (c) .
2. Find two numbers that multiply to (ac) and add up to (b) .
3. Rewrite the middle term (bx) using these two numbers. For example, if the numbers are (p) and (q) , rewrite (bx) as $(px + qx)$.
4. Group the terms into two binomials.
5. Factor out the GCF from each binomial.
6. If done correctly, you should have a common binomial factor. Factor this out.

Example: Factor $(2x^2 + 7x + 3)$

1. $(a = 2), (b = 7), (c = 3)$.
2. $(ac = 2 \times 3 = 6)$.
3. We need two numbers that multiply to 6 and add to 7. These are 1 and 6.
4. Rewrite $(7x)$ as $(1x + 6x)$: $(2x^2 + 1x + 6x + 3)$.
5. Group: $((2x^2 + x) + (6x + 3))$.
6. Factor GCF from each group: $(x(2x + 1) + 3(2x + 1))$.
7. Factor out the common binomial $((2x + 1))$: $((2x + 1)(x + 3))$.

Perfect Square Trinomials

These are special cases of trinomials that are the result of squaring a binomial. They have a distinct pattern:

1. $a^2 + 2ab + b^2 = (a + b)^2$
2. $a^2 - 2ab + b^2 = (a - b)^2$

How to identify them:

1. The first and last terms must be perfect squares.
2. The middle term must be twice the product of the square roots of the first and last terms.

Example: Factor $9x^2 - 12x + 4$

1. $9x^2 = (3x)^2$ (so $a = 3x$)
2. $4 = 2^2$ (so $b = 2$)
3. Check the middle term: $(2 \times (3x) \times 2 = 12x)$. Since the middle term in the trinomial is $(-12x)$, it fits the pattern $a^2 - 2ab + b^2$.

Factoring Polynomials with Four Terms

1. Group: $((6x^3 + 9x^2) + (-4x - 6))$.
2. Factor GCF from first pair: $(3x^2(2x + 3))$.
3. Factor GCF from second pair: $(-2(2x + 3))$. (We factored out -2 to get the same binomial).
4. Factor out the common binomial $(2x + 3)$: $(2x + 3)(3x^2 - 2)$.

General Strategy for Factoring Polynomials
